1	Paraphrase	Aug 29-31	<p>Definition:express the meaning of (the writer or speaker or something written or spoken) using different words, especially to achieve greater clarity.</p> <p>Synonyms: restate, explain, restatement</p> <p>Example: Mr Casas asked Alexandra Garcia to <i>paraphrase</i> t Tulare Union High School's Mission Statement Tulare Union High School, in partnership with the students, parents, and the community, will provide a safe environment that inspires and challenges the intellectual, social, emotional, and physical development of all students, with respect for all members of a global community.</p>
2	Elaboration	Sept 1-8	Definition: the addition of more detail

			<p>concerning what has already been said.</p> <p>Synonyms: detail, say more</p> <p>Example: When Brooklyn Limas was asked to elaborate on her favorite novel, she explained the characters, setting and plot.</p>
3	Inference	Sept 11-15	<p>Definition:a conclusion reached on the basis of evidence and reasoning</p> <p>Synonyms: interpret, assumption</p> <p>Example: Since Leonardo Renteria Gamboa had no facts about Mrs. Reese’s cooking class, he decided to refrain from making an inference about the deliciousness of the class.</p>
4	Relevant	Sept 18-22	<p>Definition:appropriate to the current time, period, or circumstances; of contemporary interest.</p> <p>Synonyms:important, pertinent, proper</p> <p>Example: Jordan Penn shared relevant college information to his AVID class.</p>
5	Context	Sept 25-29	<p>Definition: the circumstances that form the setting for an event, statement, or idea, and in terms of which it can be fully understood and assessed.</p> <p>Synonyms: background, situation</p> <p>Example: The players took Mr. Freitas’, the awesome TUHS baseball coach’s, comments completely out of context. They thought they needed to run 10 miles a day.</p>
6	Integrate	Oct 2-6	<p>Definition:combine (one thing) with another so that they become a whole.</p> <p>Synonyms: combine, conform</p> <p>Example:Steven Toste did a wonderful job integrating textual evidence in his essay</p>

7	Inconsistent	Oct 9-13	<p>Definition:not staying the same throughout.</p> <p>Synonyms: changeable, unpredictable, varying, erratic, inconsistent</p> <p>Example: Ms Lapadula suggested we cancel golf practice. The weather pattern is too inconsistent, and it might rain.</p>
8	Irrelevant	Oct 16-20	<p>Definition:not connected with or important t to something</p> <p>Example:</p> <p>Synonyms:</p>
9	Acknowledge	Oct 23-27	<p>Definition:accept or admit the existence or truth of</p> <p>Example:</p> <p>Synonyms:</p>
10	Affix	Oct 30-Nov 3	<p>Definition:stick, attach, or fasten (something) to something else.</p> <p>Example:</p> <p>Synonyms:</p>
